Winter has firmly settled around us with its blankets of snow, morning frosts crunching underfoot, and stark bitter chills in the air. Today marks the beginning of the winter solstice, heralded by the shortest day as well as the longest night. From this point on the darkness gradually recedes, the days slowly lengthen and a gentle journey towards spring and summer begins.

This evening we will celebrate the mystery of darkness by exploring its strength, and its beauty, in music and in words. As we banish the cold and gather together, we embark on a journey, shedding light on what darkness really means.

Tonight's concert brings this reflection to life with a suite of moving texts, woven throughout the evening. Inspired by the songs in our programme, these words by writer and artist Mark Croasdale, performed by actor Julie Hesmondhalgh, explore the essence of darkness, the festive season and our innermost feelings about them both.

Our programme tonight is a heady cocktail of new and old, modern and traditional, bringing together well known Christmas carols with new and less familiar melodies. Our annual gueer carol this year is composed by Lucy Armstrong, with words by Rebecca Hurst, and is a theatrical and vibrant depiction of a chance encounter with a handsome stranger at a Christmas party. We also have new arrangements of music by Joy Becker, a Manchester based singer/songwriter who performed with us in this very space in 2021 and Robin, Why Do You Sing? by Dominie Hooper, our first ever queer carol commission in 2019.

So sit back and let our voices take you on a journey from darkness to light, on this, our solstice night.

JULIE HESMONDHALGH | She/Her | Actor

Julie is best known for her award winning role as Hayley in *Coronation Street*, she has also appeared in *Happy Valley*, *Doctor Who*, *Inside No 9*, *Broadchurch* (for which she was BAFTA nominated) and most recently *Alma's Not Normal* and *Mr Bates vs the Post Office*.

Theatre roles include *Punch* at Nottingham Playhouse which will be transferring to the Young Vic in London in 2025, Derek Jarman's *Blue Now* at Factory International and many plays at Manchester's Royal Exchange. Julie co-runs Take Back, a political theatre collective and the fundraising group 500 Acts of Kindness.

She has written two books - A Working Diary and An Actor's Alphabet: an A-Z of Stuff I've Learnt and Stuff I'm Still Learning.

MICHAEL BETTERIDGE | He/Him | Artistic Director

Michael is a composer and choral conductor based in Manchester. Specialising in working with young and leisure-time music makers and in theatrical settings, he has led choral and opera performances across the UK and abroad, most often giving new works their premieres, including his own.

After studying composition at the Royal Northern College of Music, he was one of the first recipients of Sing for Pleasure's Young Conductors Programme. More recently he has been involved in projects such as *From Footy Fan to Opera Star* - training real-life football fans to become an opera chorus for a new opera with tenor Nicky Spence, Sky Arts and Grange Park Opera.



MARK CROASDALE | They/Them | Writer

Mark is a writer, maker & facilitator inciting gentle radical change through intimate encounters. Using storytelling, world building and wellbeing practices, Mark works to reframe the 'normal' world around us to uncover complexity and wonder in the mundane.

Recent work includes *Barbara*, an immersive theatrical experience that sensitively explores the subject of dementia through the lens of how we care for those we love and how we care for ourselves. Supported by Arts Council England, touring 2025.



LUCY ARMSTRONG | She/Her | Composer

Lucy is a graduate of the RNCM and has created works for the Bergen National Opera, Borealis Saxophone Quartet, and Cambridge Philharmonic. Passionate about outreach, she has collaborated on school and community projects, crafting operas and orchestral works.

Currently a Glyndebourne resident, her recent endeavours include works for the London Sinfonietta and other leading ensembles, storytelling and collaborations with prominent artists across the UK and Europe.

REBECCA HURST | She/Her | Writer

Rebecca is a writer, opera-maker, illustrator, and researcher. She has published a poetry collection, *The Iron Bridge* with Carcanet and a pamphlet, *The Fox's Wedding*, with The Emma Press.

Her music theatre and choral works, created with composers, have been widely performed across the UK and Europe. Recent commissions include *Voices of the Sands* as Deal Festival, *Looking West* for Presteigne and Ryedale Festivals and *The Gardener* at Salford Choral Society.

Rebecca lectures in Creative Writing at the University of Manchester and leads workshops in schools, museums, and libraries.

ADAM SUMMERS | He/They | Arranger

Adam studied bassoon and composition at the Royal Northern College of Music. He focused on fostering creativity in young people, working as the vocal lead for Sefton Music Hub and as a performing arts practitioner with Artis Education. A versatile multi-instrumentalist, Adam teaches students aged 8-68 and works as a conductor, arranger, and accompanist in Greater Manchester and the north of England.

Adam has performed across the UK with orchestras and chamber groups. He is a Sunday Boy and a founding member Manchester-based five-piece ensemble of Sherpa K.

TOM HENDERSON | He/Him | Pianist

Tom studied piano with Melvyn Cooper at Warwick University. Whilst there, he performed as a soloist at the Butterworth Hall, and as a conductor and répétiteur for Warwick Student Opera (now Opera Warwick).

After graduating, Tom pursued a career as a chartered tax adviser alongside work as an accompanist. In June 2024 he performed as piano soloist at the Bridgewater Hall for Streetwise Opera. He has accompanied The Sunday Boys for more than three years.
